The year rapped up in one of the most exciting ways possible and which doesn't happen very often, an International Convention on the Australian continent, in Melbourne!

I know that I have been most fortunate to have had 2 Conventions in my DG year, Boston and Melbourne, due to Boston being in July 2023 to capture the American Independence Day celebrations. Next year it will be in Mexico City, followed by the 2026 event being staged in Hong Kong following a decision made just this week

The climax of the Convention was the swearing in of the new International President, Fabricio Oliveira from Brazil; and the successful election of Dr. Manoj Shah from Kenya as 3rd Vice President; and the introduction of the new DGs to their roles.

However, as well as that, there were numerous other exciting and inspirational events happening all over the venue and outside, including the spectacular International Parade which went through the Royal Botanical Gardens past Government House and the Shrine of Remembrance. I would have to say that the majority of the 10,000 plus registrants participated.

I made the decision to not just be a spectator at this Convention and volunteered for several jobs during the period. I drew the short straw (along with Ros Barnes from W1) to be a parade marshall for a section of the parade. Our Section covered the countries of China, India, France and Germany, along with several smaller but equally important countries. India by itself had 1000 attendees. So, marshalling some 2500 attendees in one small part of the park and getting them to enter the parade in the appropriate designated spot and line up correctly (the Indian delegation insisted on walking in 2 columns instead of 6), it was chaotic and felt like herding cats. I got my steps up fairly early that day, exactly 20,079 or 15.58kms. The result, a spectacular conga-line that stretching kilometres down the road and which took 3 hours to pass the VIP area. Australia, being the last group as they were the Host country, was followed by Matilda the kangaroo. All countries were either in their country's designated uniform or their native costume. Intermingled with the countries were 9 marching bands plus Chinese Dragons and international dancing groups. In the end, Australia won the best Country group, with the traditional "Aussie! Aussie! Aussie!" making us well known to the VIPs.

As well as all of the celebrations that took place, there was much scope for learning about the various Lions' projects at Exhibits or break-out sessions; training in Leadership, Membership and the all important Portal. Equally important was the opportunity to meet so many other Lions from all the World, usually at functions or simply sitting opposite them at meal or tea breaks. Some used the opportunity to use translation apps on their phone to converse. For some lucky enough to have been to 2 Conventions, the opportunity to rekindle that friendship.

In view of the intimacy of the event, one often found themselves in the presence of the International Leaders of Lions, past and present, as they did their rounds of engagements. This also applied to meeting some LCI staff who also came over to administer the event. For me, it was to catch up with my fellow DGs one last time before we were put in the WPB.

with Lions from around the world, discover innovative ways to grow and support clubs and commemorate another year of serving communities in need.

From July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024, more than 390 million people were helped thanks to the unwavering commitment of the more than 1.4 million Lions and Leos. Additionally, the Lions Clubs International Foundation, the charitable arm of Lions Clubs International, awarded more than \$45 million in grant funding that supported the compassionate works of Lions, empowering their service and addressing the needs of their communities both locally and globally. "In a world always in need of service and compassion, Lions and Leos rise to the occasion and provide hope to communities with unmet needs," said Dr. Patti Hill, 2023-2024 international president. "I am proud to be part of an organisation that continues growing the good and proving when Lions come together, we can change the world." Highlights from the 106th Lions International Convention included world-class entertainment from musicians and performers, including The Elton John Experience and a Parade of Nations that celebrated the cultures and diversity of Lions and Leos worldwide. Engaging seminars and inspiring keynote addresses from a panel of innovators in their field including astronaut Chris Hadfield, ocean explorer Alexandra Cousteau and tech entrepreneur Marita Cheng, challenged



Lions to take risks, rise to the occasion and continue their commitment to teamwork in order to better serve a world in need. Lions honoured non-profit organisation the <u>Stephen Lewis</u> <u>Foundation</u> with the <u>Lions Humanitarian Award</u>, the association's highest honour given to an individual or an organisation for exemplary humanitarian efforts. Additionally, Lions celebrated the winners of the <u>2023-2024 Peace Poster Contest</u> and <u>Peace Essay</u> <u>Contest</u>, where young people ages 11-13 share their ideas for a more peaceful world.



The Lions International Convention also served as a catalyst for Lions and Leos to do some good during their time in Melbourne. Volunteers participated in a handful of impactful service projects,

including providing nutritious meals to people in need, assembling braille books for blind and visually impaired readers, and cleaning up the scenic Yalukit Willam Nature Reserve.

Fabrício Oliveira, esteemed business professional and Catolé do Rocha, Paraiba, Brazil resident, was elected as the 2024-2025 international president of Lions International. A member of the Catolé do Rocha Lions Club and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) advocate, Oliveira will lead the largest membership-based humanitarian organisation in the world. In this role, he will oversee global membership growth, support LCIF and inspire clubs to meet the growing needs of communities worldwide through service.

"It is an honour to serve as the next Lions International President," said Oliveira. "As Lions, we live out our mission of service and empower future generations to join in our unwavering commitment to kindness. THE DARWIN 72ND MD LIONS CONVENTION HOW IT ALL HAPPENED

Day One - It's been a fabulous first day of the 72nd Multiple District Convention here in sunny Darwin! Today's highlights include:

A beautiful Welcome To Country by The Youth Mill Official opening by His Honour Professor the Honourable Hugh Heggie AO PSM, Administrator of the Northern Territory

Professor Len Notarus AO, Executive Director and Founder of National Critical Care & Trauma Response Centre, gave an engaging keynote address about his experience in Darwin's response to the 2002 Bali Bombings, and how that sparked the creation of the NCCTRC and the Australian Medical Assistant Team (AUSMAT).

Project Spotlight: Caring Kids - a project supported by Lions that has so far delivered over 500 Joy Boxes to kids caring for siblings/parents with disabilities or illness.

Project Spotlight: Australian Lions Hearing Dogs - over the last 42 years over 700 Hearing Assistant Dogs have been placed, free of charge, Australia wide; 9 Medical Alert Dogs have been placed since October 2022, free of charge; and a Psychiatric Assistance Dog program has been established to provide dogs to veterans through the Department of Veteran Affairs.

And the day was rounded out with a hearty business session where delegates voted on the of continuing projects, adoption of new projects, and some constitutional changes.

Day Two - Today's highlights include:

The National Leo Clubs Australia Leo Of The Year final is always a highlight hear from the amazing Leo members who are making a difference in their community and their own lives. Congratulations to Melbourne Next Generation Leo Charlize Chow on being announced as the 2024 Leo Of The Year! The Public speaking Award went to Leo Lilly Davis from the King Island Leos club District T1, An entertaining Convention host bid from Perth, who will be hosting Lions from all over Australia in 2027 - we're already excited!

Project Australian Lions Stinger Research - funding research to better understand envenoming

funding research to better understand envenoming jellyfish and other marine stingers so that there can be better management of human/animal interactions as well as improved preventative and curative measures to ensure that no sting is lethal.

Project Spotlight: Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation - funding walkers & mobility aids to get kids out of their wheelchairs and onto their feet so that they are able to walk, explore, play, work and socialise.

Project Spotlight: LCIF Adopt A Family - supporting families involved in floods to re- establish themselves.

Project Spotlight: Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF) - funding vital research to reach the goal of 100% survival for kids with cancer, not just here in Australia but around the world.

The day finished off with the option of four different workshops in four different locations around Darwin - Some Lions went on a social tour and headed off to the Darwin Military Museum and heard from the museum's director Dr Norman Cramp, who gave an interesting overview of Darwin's military developments in the leadup to the bombing of Darwin on 19 February 1942, before exploring the museum at our own pace.

Day Three - It was a full day today at the 72nd MD Convention here in Darwin!

Today's highlights include:

A moving Remembrance Ceremony, where we lions remember those lost in our Lions family in the last twelve months

Samoane Regattieri, manager of Aboriginal Bush Traders, gave an insight into the work of the art gallery and bush food inspired cafe.

Council Chairperson Vin Pang and other national project coordinators presented a number of awards in recognition of dedicated service in a variety of categories. Sacha King, the founder and managing director of TWO TWO ONE Mental Health Charity, talked about the importance of looking after our mental health and how we can offer our support for others.

Project Spotlight: Australian Lions Foundation - we got to link up with Lion Sari-Elle's Everest Marathon for Lions who is about to embark on the World's Highest Marathon on Mount Everest to raise \$120,000 for the foundation, with the current total at \$112,00). In the last twelve months, ALF have given grants totalling over \$577,000, and the National Disaster Fund has raised almost \$698,000 since its launch in November 2023.

Project Spotlight: Lions Christmas Cakes - as always, everyone loves a Lion Christmas Cake or Pudding for the festive season, and now a new 400g Lions Christmas Pudding has been launched, which we will be looking into for this Christmas season! Congratulation to the Lions Club of Gosnells 201WA who was equal with two eastern states clubs with the amount of cakes sold. The Lions Club of Rockingham was rewarded for the most improved in sales figures.

Our Lions International Director Tim Irvine spoke on the passion of Lions service and the importance of mixing things up in order to attract new members and the potential of establishing a Leo club.

Council Chairman Ferry Yonwan Foeh, from Multiple District 307 (Indonesia), and Council Chairman Stephen Barr, from Multiple District 202 (New Zealand), shared updates on what Lions have been up to in both of their countries.

Dr Barry Kirby AO, from the PNG Birthing Mothers Project, gave an insightful keynote about his work in Papua New Guinea to ensure that all women are given access to a safe birthing environment and the essentials they need to care for themselves and their baby postbirth.

Mindil Beach Sunset Markets was our destination for the Farewell Reception - watching the sunset on the beach while enjoying delicious food and good company was a fabulous way to end the day, although the humidity was unbearable....

Idols, journeys, high school, and mental health what does it all mean to you?

Idols play a very important role in our lives, as they inspire us to achieve our goals. We all go through both good and bad experiences, and they help shape our personality and our ability to overcome difficulties. Especially during high school years and beyond, taking care of our mental health is crucial. It's the foundation of our overall well-being, helping us deal with the complexities of life positively and strongly. Danny Frawley, Tom Boyd, Steven May, Bailey Smith, Nat Fyfe, Brayden Ainsworth, Sophie McDonald, Lance (Buddy) Franklin, Ian Thorpe, Osher Gunsberg, Jock Zonfrillo, Jacinta Franklin, Morgan Mitchell, Libby Trickett, Wayne Schwass, Adam Treloar, Hugh Jackman.

The names that I have just mentioned are just a few of the Australian TV stars, Models, sports stars, AFL players, and comedians who are always in the spotlight

and have shared their stories on their struggles with mental health including depression, anxiety, eating disorders, OCD, ADHD, addiction and bipolar. Today I will share my story about high school and mental health. Without any doubt I can talk about Leo's and how without Leo's I wouldn't be speaking here in front of you all

and be the person I am today. I can talk about the skills and opportunities and all the lessons I've learned but today I'm speaking on behalf of all the young people and some struggles they may have faced.

For those who haven't had the chance to know me well, my name is Lucy and I have had plenty of struggles from going through serious bullying problems, losing confidence in myself and being afraid of judgement, not being able to go to school for safety reasons, losing someone special in my life, and overall struggles with school. It's not easy to go to school when you are afraid of being bullied and harassed and for my family who got the calls for me to be sent home for safety reasons. Someone I trusted and called my friend turned their back on me. During all this with all my struggles with school bullying, I had to watch my dad lay his childhood friend to rest because of suicide. A few weeks later, I




lost my Grandad who is my Dad's Dad and a few days later I lost my dad's long time mate and neighbour to terminal cancer. It was rough and we all struggled but during all this Leo's was a partial support system for me and was a space for me not to stress or worry. Just showing up, laughing, having fun at meetings, playing games and being around people who have more knowledge and wisdom than I do. Finding time to learn scheduling and skills I wouldn't have learnt before and the joy of helping the community and just getting involved helped me

During this time, I decided to join the Lions Children of Courage committee of which I am 1 of 2 Leo's to be the first ever on the State Committee. The Children of Courage Award ceremony held earlier this year is a project dedicated to helping children who have been through difficult situations have a special day, filled with lots of joy.

Yes, Leo has helped me build confidence and provided me and my club members with multiple opportunities and experiences that we would not have got without the club and our amazing Leo advisors.

Without Leos I wouldn't have had the chance to connect with the individuals in my community, I've had opportunities in local radio to promote Leos and spread the amazing work we do. Leos has given me so much pleasure in meeting and forming new relationships in my community.

As a very important topic in recent years, Leos has helped me with my mental health and overcome challenges with school life and work.



If you didn't already know, in the most recent year, 3318 Australians took their own lives. That's 63 people each week, of those aged 16 to 24, 38.8 per cent have experienced a mental health issue in the last 12 months. From ages 16 to 85 in Australia 42.5 % experienced a mental health disorder at some time in their life. This is equivalent to 8.5 million people; this is about 2 in 5 Australians (and my family has 7 people). As well, the world has an estimated 1 in 8 people who are experiencing mental health and that is equivalent to 970 million people. To continue with another statistic during this 5-minute speech about 8 people worldwide have committed suicide.

My lessons from Leo have not only taught me life lessons and skills but have made me want to mentor other students and young people in the community struggling through the same process or struggles that I have experienced. This has led me to be a mentor to new incoming students at my high school and mentor new Leo's.

So, what this has taught me is that there will always be a battle and sometimes you will lose. It won't be about how fast you overcome it, and it definitely won't be about what's on the other side. It will always be about how you get there, the journey that it will take you on, with all the challenges you face and all the struggles you will overcome. And the people you meet and surround yourself with, to improve, change and make a difference. For me, that is through Leo's and my community and the people I continue to meet and connect with.

JESS HALDINS SPECIAL PROJECT (Cont.)

Here's my story:

Hi, My name is Jessica I am 33 years old, In 1993 when I was just two years old, Three weeks before my third birthday, I contracted Meningococcal Septicaemia strain B, As a result I had both my legs above my knees and my fingers amputated, Leaving me a quad amputee and wheelchair bound.





The number one thing I want in life is to drive a car. As soon I was legal age 15 years ago I went and got

my learner's and I've been fighting ever since for someone to give me a chance and prove to them that I can drive independently with hand controls, After many years of fighting NDIS finally approved funding for me to sit a driving assessment which I passed and shocked everyone. I am now doing driving lessons with an OT driving instructor with a car fitted with hand controls and voice activations, This car is shared between Perth and over east as there is only one car in the whole of



Australia for us disabled people to learn in, In saying that this car leaves Perth soon as we only have it for six months here and then over east will have it for six months.

While I do my driving lessons and aim to get my Ps, Which I'm aiming to try and get them by the end of the year I am fundraising to get my own car, A Kia Carnival, Why a Kia? Because I need a ramp on the back of my car so I can drive my wheelchair in and independently get in my car by myself and not rely on someone to help me access it.

I'm needing to raise \$65,000-\$70,000 to get my Kia Carnival, NDIS will fund all my modifications that I will need so I can independently drive it, But they won't touch an older car which is why I'm aiming so high.

Having my own car would be my absolute dream, It would mean so much to me, To have my own

independence and freedom to just go where ever and whenever, would be so amazing, Right now I'm still living at home and this is pretty much where I stay everyday due to not having my freedom of having a car and not being able to take myself out anywhere. Just to be able to go do simple things like go to the shop for everyday essentials would be amazing.

I don't just want this, I NEED this, This is going to help massively on my mental health and my social life, I need my freedom and my independence like any normal abled person, As someone on the disability pension I am unable to get to my target alone, I need help from the community to help get me there, Your support would mean so much and very much appreciated.

Lions of WA, we need your support for a very special piece of History to go into the HMAS Perth Memorial/Museum

At the last two District 201W2 Conventions in Harvey and Perth, we have had a presentation from the HMAS Perth (1) Foundation on the building of the HMAS Perth Memorial/Museum being built on the banks of the Swan River opposite the Leeuwin Barracks in East Fremantle.

The HMAS Perth Memorial/Museum will be officially opened in a special ceremony on the 29th June 2024, with the Black Marble Memorial Wall already in place on site with all the names of the sailors who went down with the ship in the Java Straits and those who survived their capture by the Japanese to tell their story.

With the help of the Lions in the UK, in particular Zone Chairman Glyn Williams, we have now secured a large Waterline Model of the HMS Amphion (which was sold to the Australian Navy and renamed HMAS Perth) donated from a Museum in Wales (UK) which we are now responsible for arranging its transport to Perth.

To be able to bring the Model to Perth and to complete the final work and detailing on the model, we require up to \$2,000.00 in funds and are looking for the support of the Lions of Districts W1 & W2 to achieve this.

We are asking each Club if they would consider a **donation of \$100.00** towards the project of bringing the HMS Amphion to Perth and completing the model to be displayed in the HMAS Perth Memorial/Museum in East Fremantle as a tribute and recognition to the seaman of the HMAS Perth who gave their lives to protect us and keep us free.

All funds raised will go to the transport and parts/materials for the completion of the model, with any leftover funds being donated to another specific project involving the *HMAS Perth Memorial/Museum*. This could include a Glass Case enclosure to house and display the model.

Myself and a very experienced Perth model maker Gerry Westenburg, will have the task of completing the model once it arrives in Perth to be ready to go on display.

H.M.A.S. PERTH (I) Memorial

His Majesty's Australian Ship *Perth* was commissioned into the Royal Australian Navy on 29 June 1939 and served with distinction during the early years of the Second World War. The Modified *Leander* Class light cruiser was sunk on 1 March 1942 while fighting numerically superior Japanese naval forces at Sunda Strait. At the time of her loss, *Perth* carried a complement of 681 officers, ratings, and civilian canteen staff. 353 were killed in action or perished because of the ship's sinking, and four died after reaching shore. Of the 324 who became prisoners of war of the Japanese, 106 died. 218 survived to return home.

The need to commemorate *Perth* and her gallant ship's company was first recognised by the City of Perth during the Second World War. On 12 August 1943 a plaque, 'Dedicated in grateful remembrance to the officers and men of HMAS PERTH', was unveiled at the Perth Town Hall. On 26 February 1950, the City of Fremantle Sub Section of the Naval Association of Australia instituted an annual memorial service for *Perth*. It is held at St. John's Church, Fremantle, on the last Sunday in February.

In 1964, a desire to further commemorate Perth, coupled with the need to establish a permanent headquarters for



the Navy League of Australia, Western Australian Division, led to a proposal to erect a memorial facility on the banks of the Swan River at East Fremantle. The HMAS Perth Memorial and facility was officially opened on 26 February 1967 - in time for the 25th anniversary of the Battle of Sunda Strait. The ship's Coat of Arms, which had been presented to the Perth City Council for safekeeping during the war, featured on a wall dedicated to the memory of Perth and the ship's company. As was intended, the facility accommodated the WA Navy League and the Australian Sea Cadet Corps headquarters, as well as the Sea Cadet unit TS (Training Ship) Perth.

In February 1992, to mark the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Sunda Strait, a reunion of survivors was held in Perth. Sixty *Perth* men from around Australia and New Zealand, and ten *Houston* men from the United

States attended. By 1 March 2017 - the 75th anniversary of the battle - the number of *Perth* survivors had dwindled to two. This led to public discussion about a memorial to HMAS *Perth* and the ship's company.

A working group was formed in 2018 to establish a permanent extension to the memorial to commemorate the life and loss of HMAS *Perth*. The memorial will be dedicated to the members of the ship's company who:

- 1) Perished in the Battle of Sunda Strait
- 2) Survived the battle and attempted to avoid capture
- 3) Were captured, imprisoned, and enslaved
- 4) Died as prisoners of war
- 5) Finally returned to Australia or the United Kingdom


The memorial will also acknowledge the families whose lives were forever changed by the loss of HMAS Perth on 1 March 1942. The HMAS Perth (I) Memorial Foundation Incorporated in unison with the Navy League of Australia Western Australia Division proposes to create the final extension to the memorial that will complement and enhance the existing HMAS Perth Memorial and facility. (Collectively known as the HMAS Perth Memorial Facility)

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A key requirement is that the memorial be suitable for ceremonial occasions, commemorative events, flag-raising, and wreath-laying, to facilitate both public and private remembrance. To this end, an Avenue of Honour will bear the names of the entire ship's company, with each name engraved into highly polished black granite to emphasize the solemn purpose of this place of remembrance. Of equal importance is the creation of a special space for contemplation and reflection within a memorial setting. Another requirement is that the memorial acknowledge the 'All States' make-up of *Perth's* ship's company. Officers and ratings came from all corners of Australia, as well as the United Kingdom. To reflect this, the Port Division (home port) of each man will be shown next to his name.

These requirements have been met by the concept design produced by acclaimed sculptors Charles Smith and Joan Walsh-Smith (Smith Sculptors), whose works include the HMAS *Sydney (II)* Memorial at Geraldton, the National Memorial to the Australian Army in Canberra, and the John Curtin statue in Fremantle.

The memorial will be in the form of a glass-walled 'ship's prow' shaped space which is the central symbolic focus and monumental manifestation of HMAS *Perth* (I). Two steel-framed 10-metre-long ceramic glass walls, featuring images of *Perth* and members of the ship's company, will project forward from the front of the 12-metre-wide hall, coming together to give the effect of a ship's bows. A flood-lit flagpole will be provided at the peak, and two steps will be placed at the foot of the stem, for ceremonial and wreath-laving occasions.

Each wall will consist of two layers of 12-millimetre-thick glass, into which the images will be fused with ceramic inks. The resulting 25-millimetre-thick glass panels will be grey blue in colour, virtually bullet-proof, and strikingly effective. Lighting at night will give the panels an ethereal blue hue. The roofed 12-metre by 10-metre by 10-metre internal space created will form the special place for contemplation and reflection. It is envisioned those two life-size statues of a naval rating and a prisoner of war, proudly standing back-to-back in the centre of the space, will represent the two phases of a *Perth* sailor's war.

The HMAS *Perth* (I) Memorial Foundation and Navy League of Australia Western Australia Division working officially launched the project in 2019. Cabinet report for Insurance, Risk & Child Safety. PDG Peter Lamb

The MD Insurance Committee is happy to announce that JUA Underwriting Agencies, our National Broker, has been purchased by A.B. Phillips Insurance and Risk Brokers with this announcement being made at the Darwin Convention. A. B. Phillips has offices in Victoria, Perth and Broome and has been operating in Australia since 1975. The announcement also indicated JUA will continue to operate under its own name and their staff will continue under the direction of A.B Phillips from their Sydney Office.

All Lions Insurance policies will remain in place and the common renewal date of the 30th September will also remain in place.

Any policy enquiries including renewals, alterations and claims should continue to be directed to Lion Garry Galvin, our National Authorised Representative. Garry's contact details are available in the Lions Directory.

PDG Bob Korotcoff remains on the MD Insurance Committee as a committee member only, and should not be contacted under the new structure, all communications should be directed to Lion Garry Galvin. PDG Bob has given over 45 years of service to this committee and should be congratulated for his long and distinguished service to Lions Insurance.

State representatives such as myself are still available for consultation and advice, however, we have no underwriting authority and can only assist with facilitating new or existing policies.

Important Insurance Information for all Clubs

During the recent International Convention in Melbourne, the MD Authorised Representative Lion Garry Galvin met with the International Broker for LCI, and Garry has released the following statement to all 201WA Clubs.

Kindly note that Lion Garry is your first port of call for all insurance policies and renewals – please do not contact PDG Bob Korotcoff, as he is no longer the Authorised Representative for the MD Lions Insurance. Club Kids Trains.

Our Public Liability policy will continue to cover all Club Kids Trains which are already insured by Lions Insurance. The Liability Policy is in two parts - the primary policy (issued out of the USA) is for \$1 million, and in Australia, we have an Excess Layer policy of \$19 million. The Excess Layer policy follows the primary policy in terms of the cover and any exclusions. At this time, there are no exclusions limiting or preventing the use of the train. I should mention, however, that these types of equipment are monitored by the insurer and there can, from time to time, be concerns regarding their use, as the safety of these units can, sometimes, be questionable. Should these units ever be excluded by the insurers, you can rest assured that all Clubs in Australia will be notified immediately.

Special Events

Where Clubs are involved in such events where <u>non-Lions groups</u> participate by association or otherwise, it is important that evidence of a current Liability Insurance - Certificate of Currency is obtained from those participants. Lion Garry can provide Named parties (i.e. Shopping Centres) on a Certificate of Currency when sufficient notification is given for this request.

Lions Cancer Institute & LEHP.

There is also no issue with the Eye Health equipment, with regard to the Public Liability policy either. The only thing that did come up recently was in relation to the use of qualified medical professionals when using this or similar medical equipment. The policy does not cover such medical professionals who are still in practice and earning their living from their profession, even though they may be volunteering on an unpaid basis for Lions at the time. If they are still actively engaged in their profession, any claim must be put to their professional indemnity insurer as the Lions Public Liability policy excludes cover for people who are licensed medical practitioners.

Club BBQ Trailers

Concerning the Club's BBQ trailers, these trailers are currently insured on a Master Policy with Vero Insurance. The policy covers the trailer on a fully comprehensive basis, with the exception that this cover is excluded whilst the trailer is being used for cooking purposes. To overcome this exclusion, the Lions Brokers (JUA Underwriting Agency Pty Ltd) have arranged a separate cover which comes into play when you are cooking. Clubs should ensure they have this second separate cover whilst cooking on a BBQ Trailer. Both of these covers are Optional Extra Insurance and incur a separate premium to the insurance, covered under the semi-annual dues. The Trailer policy and the policy covering the cooking exclusion expire on 30th September and you will receive renewal invitations for these during August/early September.

Lions Policy Common Renewal Dates

The Lions Public Liability policy for \$20M expires on 1st September annually. All other mandatory policies fall due on the 30th September and are paid from your Semi-annual dues. I mention this as Clubs need to be aware that they will need to update any Certificates of Currency, that they have out with their local council, for projects which run over the expiry date for the Liability cover.

It is the Club's responsibility to ensure that all their insurance is adequate and appropriate for all risks involved. Please contact Lion Garry Galvin (by email at insurance@lions.org.au or by phone at 0408 674 770) if you require any assistance for any insurance matters.

Vision for Change: Addressing Eye Health Challenges

In Pakistan, there are 570,000 adults grappling with blindness due to cataracts. This is the most

Through this impactful grant funding, Lions in Pakistan will reach people dealing with diabetes-related vision impairment,

common cause of avoidable blindness in the country with 51.5% of the blind community burdened with it. Additionally, 11.77% of citizens

in Pakistan have type 2 diabetes mellitus, with 29% of those people experiencing diabetic retinopathy (DR), an eye condition that can cause vision loss and blindness in people who have diabetes. Lions saw the magnitude of this problem in Pakistan, and knew it needed to be



addressed. The Lions of District 305-N2 received a SightFirst Grant of US\$131,463 from Lions Clubs International

Foundation (LCIF) to develop infrastructure and expand diagnostic and treatment services for cataracts, uncorrected refractive errors (URE) and DR at the hospital of Khyber Eye Foundation (KEF). KEF was established as a charitable hospital in 1998. On average, KEF examines approximately 54,000 outpatients, organizes 18 outreach camps and performs cataract surgeries on 5,500 individuals each year.

Approximately 8,000 people with diabetes are

examined and managed by their medical specialist or diabetologist each year. In addition, KEF



monitors glaucoma patients and performs glaucoma surgeries. Each year, KEF also diagnoses approximately 900 patients with glaucoma, performs multiple surgeries and offers treatment using topical eye drops. KEF is also dedicated to addressing these illnesses at an early age to ensure children are not burdened with the stress of vision problems. They run a school-based screening program for children ages six to 10. The program includes free eye exams to identify refractive errors and other eye conditions, free eyeglasses, referrals to KEF for students in need of further treatment and education on avoidable blindness and personal hygiene.

KEF has an optical workshop that provides a range of prescriptions for school children and paying individuals with URE. Between 2008 and 2016, KEF performed 17,118 refraction assessments and distributed 12,402 spectacles. Last year, 80% of patients who received cataract surgery had good outcomes, so Lions are hoping to expand on that success to serve more people in Pakistan. The LCIF grant will enable Lions to purchase the equipment necessary to conduct eye exams and treat cataracts, URE and DR. This includes a new argon laser since KEF's current one has not been functional for the last three years and will allow staff to reinstate laser treatments for DR patients. With this investment in equipment, Lions will ensure tens of thousands of people across the country never suffer from vision loss.

Through this impactful grant funding, Lions in Pakistan will reach people dealing with diabetes-related vision impairment, cataracts and more. Their efforts will prevent blindness and restore sight, offering

patients a renewed chance to see.



Professor Morgan Steps down as MD of LEI



At Lions Eye Institute's (LEI) recent AGM Professor William (Bill) Morgan officially stepped down from his position as Managing Director of LEI.

Professor Morgan is a valuable leader, clinician and researcher, whose contribution to the Institute over many decades has been outstanding. Professor Morgan has been the MD of the Institute since 2019 and during that time has also been the LEI

representative on the Board of the Lions Save-Sight Foundation (LSSF). He feels that now is the right time to focus more energy on a number of exciting projects that will contribute to the success and sustainability of LEI and will continue to work closely with the Institute as a researcher and clinician. The Directors of LSSF are also delighted that he will continue to be the representative for LEI on the Board as his insight and overall knowledge of the needs of the Institute are invaluable in ensuring the Board meets it's objectives as set out under our Constitution, which invariably answer the call set out by Helen Keller to Lions International back in 1925. to be "Knights of the Blind".

Board Structure

To reflect the merger of our two Districts on 1st July 2024, our LSSF Constitution was amended at the AGM held on the 6th June 2024.

The Board was very pleased to see that many Lions members were able to attend the AGM even with the severe weather that was experienced. This enabled the important Constitutional amendments to be passed. Thank you to all those members who braved the conditions to attend.

The amendment took into account the merging to one District and the changes made affected the Board structure. In essence the changes made to the Board were going from four (4) Vice District Governors down to two (2), our elected District Directors, increased to four (4), whereas previously it was two (2) from each of the two districts, so in effect remains as four (4) elected District Directors and our Cabinet Chairperson comes back from two (2) to one (1).


The amendments now change the Board from a total of 13 Directors to 10 Directors, still enabling an effective Board makeup of your Foundation.

Focus on Dr Danial Roshandel

Dr Daniel Roshandel is a researcher at the Lions Eye Institute and he is funded by your Foundation. Dr Roshandel is an overseas trained ophthalmologist who has specialised in ocular surface diseases and stem cell transplantation. He obtained his PhD in inherited retinal diseases from The University of Western Australia (UWA) and joined the Lions Eye Institute as a postdoctoral research fellow to continue his research on advanced cell therapies for end-stage ocular surface diseases and pursue his career as a clinician-scientist.

Dr Roshandel has been involved in various clinical research projects since 2005 with published articles in various journals. He contributed to developing various innovative surgical techniques that improved the clinical outcomes of the management of limbal stem cell deficiency, a common cause of corneal blindness, and other severe ocular surface disorders. During his PhD, he made a significant contribution in the field of developing clinical trial endpoints for specific types of inherited retinal diseases and gained international recognition for his publications in adaptive optics retinal imaging.



Dr Roshandel's current projects involve developing novel therapeutic techniques for advanced ocular surface diseases. With your Foundations support he is researching to produce corneal cells from adult stem cells that can revolutionise the treatment of end-stage ocular surface diseases.

Touring Lions Eve Institute



The trachi tube that protrudes from his throat has a cap on it and this was dislodged several times while we were there and has to be immediately replaced.

He needs to be constantly watched.

Dear Lions Leaders,

Many of you would be aware of much of the country slipping back into drought and others experiencing dry times outside of normal climate conditions for this time of year.

Vast areas of Southern Australia are yet to get their "Autumn Break" of seasonal rainfall so that their farmers can begin sowing, others have been hand feeding stock for part of the last 12 months if not most of it. In these areas, fodder has become increasingly in short supply. Farmers are worried what the future brings. Rural communities rely on the input of productive farmers to keep their towns and regions alive.

Some Lions Clubs and Districts have reached out to our Lions Australia National Project Need for Feed for help, others are yet to ask.

The purpose of this email is to let you know that help is available. All you have to do is ask and between us we will find a way to make it happen.

We will ask you for a commitment from your Club and or District to help facilitate local and state government support and support from your states farming industry group to lobby on our behalf.

I would like to give you an example of how this approach has worked to the benefit of all in our most recent campaign, and that was to provide aid to the farmers of King Island where we worked hand in hand with the local Lions Club and their T1 Tasmanian Lions District, to achieve amazing results.

This whole campaign was put together and the first phase carried out over the space of 3 months. We are in the final stages of planning a second round of assistance.

An overview of our main delivery to King Island is shown in this Channel 9 A Current Affair interview with our Need for Feed Chairman PDG Graham, which aired nationally on prime time TV on Saturday May 18, which I have attached to this email.

Lions Club Project Need for Feed - Darwin Convention Report 2024.

The last year has been yet another of those that just when we thought things were quietening down, something happened to make us flat out again. We had not long finished the final recovery phase of the floods around Forbes in the NSW Central West and right across the top of Victoria into South Australia, and fires earlier last year near Taralga north of Goulburn also in NSW, and were kind of wondering what we were going to be doing next when we were met with fires and flooding in our own District in early Spring. We were able to respond to that within days, along with a fire in the Bega Valley in south east NSW.

Not long after that, fires started breaking out in various other parts of New South Wales and some of southern and central Queensland. At one stage we were working on 6 fires within NSW and had responded to another 5 in Queensland. We have had requests for assistance for fire and or drought in all of the eastern mainland states including South Australia. Over the last 12 months we have completed 15 hay runs into and out of all of those states as well as Tasmania. There have also been numerous individual deliveries filling in the gaps between

runs. Our volunteers have often finished one hay pick up or delivery and turned straight around to reload and do it all again because there was someone in need.

The Lions Districts that we have delivered to over the last 12 months include N1, N2, N3, N4 and N5, V1-4, V3, V5 and V6, Q1, Q3, and Q4, and also C1 and C2. Where possible with our deliveries we have involved and worked directly with local Lions Clubs.

As we enter our 18th, year, it's worth reflecting on our journey thus far. Since our humble beginnings back in 2006/2007 the project has grown and grown to the point where the total value of aid delivered over the life of the project has now topped over 45 million dollars. That's the equivalent of around 6,000 truckloads of hay and

other fodder. These deliveries are usually accompanied by household hampers, personal care packs, sometimes Lions teddies and toys for the kids, and always food for our best mates. Every farm has at least one dog!

This is all made possible by very generous and ongoing support from not only our own members and volunteers, but also our supporting Lions Clubs, other service clubs, community groups and of course the Australian public. That is something we all as Lions individually and as an organisation should be extremely

proud of. Our Lions Club project Need for Feed has for some time now been recognised as the leading provider

of emergency fodder at a state and national level by governments and other agencies. That is in no small part due to the hard work and dedication of our loyal band of Lions members and other volunteers. Today Need for Feed remains the only group among the big four registered Australian farm charities run totally by volunteers.

Over the next year ahead, we will of course continue to do what we have always done and that is to support our farmers and rural communities in times of need, wherever they are.



You may want to have a walk around the village first up to familiarise yourself with your surroundings. Take your camera, binoculars and a bottle of water.



This year our Community Jumbo Auction was held on Saturday 23 March 2024. In the lead up we endeavoured to promote this event differently, via our road signs, Toodyay Herald advertising and a Facebook campaign, including interviews with our beneficiaries, auctioneer, and advertising some of our fantastic items to be auctioned.

Our main goals from 2023 were to increase the number of people attending the auction and to increase the average sale. In saying this it can be difficult to evaluate an advertising campaign, however, here are a few of our statistics:

- •Our sellers increased from 26 to 48
- •Our buyers increased from 66 to 118
- •We sold three lots for more than \$1000
- •Out total sales increase from \$7,444 to \$26,824
- •The average value of a lot increased from \$32.20 to \$121.27 and
- •Our bottom line increased from \$2,722 to approximately \$7,500.

This was one of our most successful auctions in memory. Speaking of donations this grew also from last year with 33 lots of donations from community members and local businesses; items included bales of hay, loads of gravel, sand and water, hardware and power tools and stock feed, to name a few. Each of these items sold over the reserve price.

As a Club we would like to thank our volunteers 'Friends of Lions' for your assistance on the Friday set up and on the day with auction scribing and running sheets back to the office, we could have not done this without you.


