





Expanding Camp Sweet Life: The Type 1 Diabetes Camp for Youth

Surrounded by beautiful trees and a glimmering lake, Camp Sweet Life's idyllic location in southern

Minnesota echoes the message of empowerment its counsellors offer students with type 1 diabetes. Living with diabetes as a child can be challenging. It requires constant monitoring and a level of responsibility that may feel overwhelming for someone so young. Past District Governor (PDG) Anna Wickenhauser says, "I was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes at 15 and I thought my world was over."

Expanding Camp Sweet Life: The Type 1 Diabetes Camp for Youth (Cont)

Camp Sweet Life is a five-day, four-night type 1 diabetes camp for youth aged eight to fifteen, with a day camp option for children aged five to seven. The goal of the accredited medical diabetes camp is to transform the lives of children living with type 1 diabetes and their families by providing fun opportunities for learning and connecting. It includes breaks for snacks, nutrition education, blood glucose checks, insulin management and networking opportunities for children with type 1 diabetes. PDG Wickenhauser says, "I believe in this program because it helps kids learn to take care of themselves and gives them a sense of

responsibility."

The camp was established in 2010 and within a decade, it had outgrown its facilities as the number of campers increased by 311%. With a new location in 2019, Camp Sweet Life could increase its reach and improve the quality and range of support, services and education it offered campers and their families. As camp enrolment and interest continued to rise, additional staff were added, and the counsellor and counsellor-in-training program was extended. Lions of District 5M-2

recognised the significance of supporting the expansion and enhancement of the camp, so they decided to apply for a grant.

In 2019, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) awarded Lions a Diabetes Grant for US\$37,500 to enhance Camp Sweet Life. The LCIF grant funded medical supplies, counsellor training and programmatic expenses. Timothy Emmers, president of Camp Sweet Life says, "The LCIF grant was phenomenal. The way we have expanded wouldn't have been possible without LCIF." Additionally, Lions volunteered with setup, registration and other activities throughout the camp.

More campers are now able to participate in educational experiences about diabetes and its monitoring and medication, as well as diabetes management,

including diet and daily physical activity relevant to their age group. Beyond learning opportunities, they are given the chance to socialise and build a peer support network through attendance at the camp. Timothy has two daughters with type 1 diabetes, and he says, "One of my daughters still keeps in touch with her Camp Sweet Life friends throughout the course of the year." Camp activities include campfires, water activities, arts and crafts, archery, dance, nature exploration, group games and STEM activities. A staff member raved about the camp saying, "Watching kids grow in confidence is awesome. It is amazing to see them making new friends and sharing with each other about diabetes."

LCIF Diabetes Grants support diabetes youth camps and retreats, diabetes screening activities with comprehensive follow-up care plans, infrastructure and equipment acquisition for existing diabetes care facilities and training of professionals and community diabetes educators. Lions Fund Vital New Foodbank Delivery Van

In an inspiring show of commitment to serving those in need, Lions in Victoria joined forces with the



Australian Lions Foundation (ALF) and the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) to fund a new food delivery van for Foodbank Victoria.

This project will support the distribution of frozen and shelf-stable foods to communities across the state, helping alleviate food insecurity for thousands each day.

The partnership with Foodbank Victoria began when Lions Past District Governor Graham Bryant started a volunteer initiative at the Yarraville warehouse. Lions members stepped in to assist with essential order preparation whenever Foodbank's regular volunteers were unavailable.

It was during one of these volunteer sessions that Lions asked Foodbank Victoria how they could offer additional support. The answer came in the form of a new delivery van, designed to expand Foodbank's reach and impact.

To make this vision a reality, Lions in Victoria worked together to secure funding. Lions leaders collaborated closely, bringing in grant support from both ALF and LCIF and contributing financially from each district. Through the dedication of the Lions, the necessary funding for a new van was secured.

The delivery van was handed over to Foodbank Victoria in a formal ceremony arranged by LCIF Chair Lee Murray, who served as Project Manager for the Lions Delivery Van initiative. The event was attended by Lions representatives from across Victoria who

celebrated the arrival of this much-needed resource for their community.



The new van will allow Foodbank Victoria to reach more people than ever before, a mission that has become more urgent as food insecurity in Victoria continues to rise. In recent years, the number of people experiencing food stress daily has grown significantly, making this addition to Foodbank's fleet critical to ensuring that nutritious food reaches those who need it most. Lions' volunteers continue to support Foodbank Victoria. On the first Wednesday of every month, Lions members gather at the Yarraville warehouse to volunteer.

This project exemplifies the core values of Lions Australia – service, community, and compassion. Together, Lions Clubs across Victoria have made a lasting impact, helping ensure that families and individuals facing hardship receive the support they need.

On days like these, Lions members can take pride in knowing they have made a meaningful difference, one delivery at a time.

From Biobank to breakthroughs


The Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research

Foundation (ALCCRF) has made a transformative impact on paediatric brain cancer research by donating \$600,000 to a team at the South Australian immunoGENomics Cancer Institute (SAiGENCI).

Paediatric brain cancer is the most common solid tumour in

children and the leading cause of disease-related death among Australian kids. While aggressive multi-modal treatments have boosted survival rates to over 70%, these treatments often come with severe side effects that affect survivors to varying degrees, potentially having a long-term impact on their physical abilities, school performance, job



prospects, and social lives. Unfortunately ~60% of survivors are unable to achieve independence as adults. There are no strategies to reduce these impacts that do not compromise cure rates underscoring the need to develop new solutions that ensure children with brain cancer have optimal survival and survivorship outcomes, while also maintaining their physical and psychosocial wellbeing.

We know very little about why the treatments affect some children more than others, but Neuro-Oncologist Professor Jordan Hansford and his team are aiming to answer this question using South Australia's first Paediatric Brain Tumour Biobank, established and operated between the South Australia Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI) and the Women's and Children Health Network (WCHN).

With new advances in molecular biology the team will further investigate brain cancers, revealing the underlying cause of the disease and beginning to balance the risks of different treatments more effectively to perhaps prevent late effects. The biobanked brain tumour samples combined with detailed clinical data provide a powerful population-based tool to study brain cancer, and the team will use this to uncover genetic and epigenetic factors that underpin the development of treatment side effects.

The ALCCRF Chair, Ron Skeem OAM said the Foundation recognised the significance of the Paediatric Brain Tumour Biobank and were attracted by the possibility to have a real impact on cancer care for children.

"We're very excited about what the outcomes might be - it's why we get involved."

Professor Hansford expressed his gratitude for the support and his hope for what the project will achieve.

"We're extremely thankful for the support of the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation, without whom this wouldn't be possible."

2024 Lions Biggest BBQ Update



A big thank you and appreciation to those clubs which have contributed to the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation. In the year to date 161 clubs have contributed \$184,574. 45, via the Lions Biggest Barbecue. Much more has been contributed by a direct grant to the Foundation. This is a marvellous achievement and reflects the care and consideration of Lions Clubs and their members to contribute to a very worthy purpose. The Lions Biggest Barbecue (LBBBQ) has a goal for this year's campaign of raising \$250,000.

There are approximately 50 clubs which submitted an Intention to Participate and are still to contribute. If your club is one of these 50, please do hold that biggest barbecue, as there are still the best part of 4 months to contribute to the Foundation.

Each club which contributes by means of a fundraiser with the LBBBQ will receive raffle tickets for an end-of-year draw to win one of three barbecue units from Bunnings. (1 ticket is allocated for every \$500 donated. So, \$2000 donated will attract 4 chances in the draw).

We look forward to your support of and for your Foundation and the children who will ultimately benefit from the research which we fund.

The purpose of the Faculty Development Institute (FDI) is to develop and expand the number of skilled faculty available for use in training at the club, zone, district, and multiple district levels.

Review the information provided below to ensure that your application meets the requirements for submission. Applicant Qualifications

Candidates for FDI must meet all qualifications before applying:

- Current member of a club within the constitutional area.
- Has not attended an FDI within the last five (5) years. (International or Local)
- Have an interest in improving training delivery skills.
- In-depth knowledge of Lions culture, Lions leadership experience, and comfort using PowerPoint is preferred.

*Current District Governors who meet the qualifications will be considered for participation on space space-available basis only. **Participant Expectations**

Upon acceptance to the institute, participants are obligated to do the following:

- Attend all sessions of the 3-day institute.
- Arrange personal travel to and from the institute.
- Complete pre-assignments before arrival.
- Pay a non-refundable, non-transferable participant fee of US\$150.
- Arrange to be observed and evaluated conducting a local training event within 6 months of attending the FDI. (OPTIONAL)

Faculty Development Institute (FDI) (Cont)

Steps to Achieving FDI Graduate Status (Optional Post-Institute Requirement)

Participants at the institute will receive a participation certificate, but this does not guarantee FDI Graduate status. To achieve graduate status the participant must:

- Review the feedback provided to you by the faculty during the institute.
 Pursue local opportunities and refine your facilitation skills.
 - a. It is recommended that participants practice their skills and incorporate the feedback received during the FDI at training events before being observed for FDI Graduate status.
- 3. Invite the GLT Coordinator or an LCIP Certified Instructor to observe you at an in-person, local training.
- 4. Provide the observer with the Training Facilitation Summary (TFS) form (download the TFS from the FDI webpage) and request that they evaluate if you have successfully demonstrated all criteria.
- 5. Submit the completed and signed TFS form to institutes@lionsclubs.org
- 6. Achieve FDI Graduate status and receive your pin.

Upon achieving FDI Graduate status, local area leaders will be notified, and your status will be updated in your Learn record. Continue to pursue training opportunities at the club, zone, region, district, and multiple district levels.



WORKING WITH CHILDREN CLUB MEMBER REQUIREMENTS

Hi Lions & Leo members

I have recently been appointed as the District Safe Child Officer for 201WA and as such, have been instructed to ensure all Clubs are aware of the MD Child Safe Policy and adhere to the conditions that apply, to any Club that has a Club/District project which deals with children and young people under 18 years of age.

Lions Australia only controls a limited number of Youth projects, that is, those adopted at Conventions or managed by a Multiple District Committee – Youth of the Year, Youth Exchange & Leos. The principles of the policy though can be applied to any youth project operated by a Lions Club or District and the Multiple District strongly recommends Lions Clubs and Districts adopt these principles in their policy minutes or establish their own procedure in Club Board minutes, to apply to their own youth projects.

Even though in most jurisdictions the legislation varies as to whom/when a 'Working with Children Check' is needed, it is **MD201 policy** that any member or volunteer directly involved in any youth program obtains a Working with Children Check. Please refer to the Lions Australia Child Safe Policy Resources web page for more information at https://lionsclubs.org.au/our-governance-structure/md201-child-safe-policy-resources/

If your club does not wish to apply this policy to all members, it is essential that you control participation in youth projects to exclude those members who do not hold a valid working-with children-check.

Lions Australia encourages its members working with children to source community-based training to supplement this policy. The availability of such training can be sourced through the WA government child safety regulation website. https://workingwithchildren.wa.gov.au/.

Where 'training' is referred to in this policy, it refers to:

- Reading and becoming familiar with this policy and procedures, and
- Discussing this policy and procedure at a Club meeting.

Minutes of the meeting where the Child Safe Policy has been reviewed should be kept, documenting the names of attendees.

WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECK (WWCC)

A Working with Children Check is a criminal screening check. It aims to prevent people who may pose a risk to children or youth from coming into contact with them through their employment or in a voluntary capacity.

- 1. Usually, a Working with Children Check or its equivalent is only required for longer-term work with young people, however, it is **Lions Policy** that any member of any Club operating Youth Programs who has direct involvement with young people, obtain a Working with Children Check (WWCC)
- 2. Lions operating any youth program must appraise themselves of the West Australian legislation.
- 3. The Working with Children Check register must contain the name, date of birth, registration number, and expiration date.
- 4. The Child Safe Officer must maintain the Working with Children's Check Register noting that this position may be held concurrently with other roles. The Club President or District Governor should not hold the role of Child Safe Officer as they may be engaged in future investigations.
- 5. Where a number of youth programs are conducted, it is reasonable to maintain a single WWC Register to cover all programs.
- 6. It is highly desirable to eliminate risks to young people participating in a Lions Youth program by following the Child Safe policy rather than relying on a Working with Children Check and operators of Youth Projects should prepare a documented risk management plan for each activity.

For those members who may not have seen a West Australian WWC Card, I have attached a copy of my card for your information. I will in a separate email, be requesting all Clubs with members holding a current WWCC Card assist me in establishing a **District Register** by advising me of their member details summarized in Item "C" above.

I appreciate these requirements may fall under the category of "Heavy Reading" or "it doesn't concern us", but please be aware the WWC Act in WA now has the power to fine anyone not complying with the Act. Please take this email to your next Board/Dinner meeting for discussion, and where applicable adopt the Child Safe Policy in the Club's Policy Minutes or monthly meeting minutes where your Club doesn't have Policy Minutes.

LIONS CONDUCT WHEN WORKING WITH CHILDREN

Lions Australia is a highly respected organisation through its excellent work in the community and overseas projects. Its logo is highly recognisable and our members are often seen in the wider community performing much needed beneficial tasks and as members we are proud of our achievements. Given this, it is important for both our members and the community to maintain confidence in our activities. A significant part of maintaining this confidence is for all members to adhere to a Code of Conduct. Therefore the following are reasonable expectations we put on ourselves when working with children.

Lion members and volunteers shall:-

- 1. At all times whilst at a youth camp or other Lions organised youth events wear a Lions Identification Badge or Passes or lanyards.
- 2. At all times we will take all reasonable steps to protect children and young people in our care.
- 3. Not develop a relationship with child or young person that could be misconstrued as grooming behaviour by others. Not develop a relationship with a child or young person that could threaten the child or young person's safety or wellbeing.
- 4. Will not disclose children or persons private information other than within the obligations of the Child Safe Policy.
- 5. Be accepting of all children and young people in our care regardless of their ethnicity, religious beliefs, or gender identification.
- 6. Always treat children and young people in our care with respect.
- 7. Always act in accordance with Lions Australia child Safe policy.
- 8. Never offer alcohol or illicit drugs of any kind to a child or young person.
- 9. Never be under the influence of alcohol or illicit drugs whilst in the position of care or responsibility of a child or young person.
- 10. Never expose children or young people to pornographic material from any medium.
- 11. Always know where the child or young person is when in your charge.
- 12. Never intimidate a child or young person through tone of voice or verbally abusive language.
- 13. Report any breach of the code of conduct through the Lions Feedback and Enquiries form located on the website here. Keep in touch/feedback.
- 14. Uphold, respect, and protect those members and volunteers who in good faith report a breach of this code.
- 15. Any breach of the Child Safe Policy may result in action by the Lions club to restrict the member's activities, suspend or cancel their membership.




parents and by the end of the evening, 7 of those 10 had decided already to take membership forms and join up.

On arrival, you are greeted by "Julie and Les" who will direct you to your accommodation. They are also a

valuable source of information on birds and animals in the woodland and activities in and around the village. Your cottage will have been 5 star glampingly prepared for your comfort and convenience. After you have unloaded your gear and settled in, sit on the porch and contemplate your surroundings. Please BYO linen, quilt, pillows and towels, or sleeping bag; or hire some for interstate/international

visitors. The paddock out front has kangaroos, currawongs and

magpies; numbats and echidnas if you look for them, and numerous bird species. Such a peaceful and relaxing hideaway. At night you may be serenaded by the beautiful songs of the bush stone curlews.

You may want to have a walk around the village first up to familiarise yourself with your surroundings. Take your camera, binoculars and a bottle of water.

Back at your accommodation, if it is cold you may want to set and light the fire. This may require a bit of wood chopping (not on the slabs please) from bags purchased at the office/caretakers (@ \$10 per bag). Once lit you can sit in the comfy lounge chairs and make plans for the next day.

The village has an old tennis court, playground with a flying fox; and plenty of space for the children to ride bikes and play games.

The Woodland has walk trails, drive trails, dams, and picnic areas to keep you busy during the day. Pre-book a tour to "Barna Mia" for the evening.

The kitchen is fully equipped with a full size fridge and stove, microwave, and all crockery, cookware, utensils and cutlery to enable easy meal preparation. So in no time you are fed, the dishes washed with good hot water and the kitchen tidied.

LIONS YOUTH OF THE YEAR (YOTY) 2024/2025

As you may be aware the number of clubs participating in our Youth of the Year program has been declining in recent years. A reduction in the number of clubs participating obviously means less students have the opportunity to develop their skills and build their confidence as they embark into the wider world. This year we must all do our very best to encourage schools to nominate students to take part in the program. The program is far too important to let it slide any further.

It is our primary youth program, that connects Lions to young people in our communities. Over the decades the program has inspired hundreds of young people; to build confidence and sharpen their skills as they move through the finals. The program also "showcases" Lions in the community and the valuable work we to do.

Last year a number of clubs held joint club finals, if your club wasn't one of those clubs I would encourage you to do so this time around. Apart from sharing the work load it will build a bigger audience and necessitate only three judges instead of six. Clubs working together will only enhance fellowship and camaraderie within our organisation.

It is important that you let Michael Bell or Kim Wilkinson know what your clubs' intentions are in relation to the Youth of the Year program as soon as possible, so that planning can happen in relation to Zone and

Regional finals. Your Club Final would need to be held by the end of February 2025. If you do intend approaching schools directly now is the time to do it.

There are a number of options available to clubs.

Please select one of the below options and let us know as soon as possible:

- A. You will approach schools directly and recruit students to represent your club
- B. You will approach schools directly, but if you aren't successful in recruiting students you are happy to hold a Club Final, with students from a "pool" not attached to any club.
- C. You prefer not to approach schools in your area but are happy to hold a club final, with students sourced from a "pool"
- D. You don't wish to be involved in the program

It is recommended that YOTY Chairpersons hold a Working With Children Check (WWC). However, if that is not possible entrants must not be left alone with a single Lion, they must at all times be supervised by a male and female Lions member.

Attached to this email is a power point presentation, a student application form and a video which was professionally produced last year which you can email to your local school/s.

It is not costly or daunting for a club to hold a Youth of the Year Club Final, most clubs hold their finals on a business or social meeting night.

In the Financial Year 2024 Lions Hearing Foundation enabled the delivery of 3 key Grant projects:

1.Grant Name: WA State Government 2023 Innovation Booster Grant (Award \$40k)

Project Title: Novel therapeutics for treatment of sensorineural Hearing Loss(SHL)

Investigator: Associate Professor Elaine Wong

LHF Contribution to Research: \$10k

LHF Contribution to Laboratory Equipment: \$27.7k Stereo Microscope – used for high magnification and sterility during individual cell selection protocols.

With this funding and equipment, Associate Professor Wong developed a laboratory proof of concept model for an inner ear organoid sensorineural hearing loss model. Specific disease models of hearing loss were established from human-derived cells in the inner ear organoid model. The new models are stable and being developed to allow to screen potential drug therapeutics to determine drug and gene therapies that could ameliorate disease progression. From this work, A/ Prof Wong has secured a pilot mentoring program with MedChem Australia. A medicinal chemist will provide expertise to A/P Wong and team to further develop inner ear therapeutic approaches for the treatment of SHL.

2. Grant Name: 2022 Telethon 7 Research grant (Award \$217k)

Project Title: Functionalised Scaffold for treatment of Chronic Suppurative Otitis Media (CSOM) in Children

Investigator: Dr Filippo Valente LHF Contribution to Research: \$5k

In this preclinical project, Dr Valente and team developed an implantable scaffold-based silk fibroin for tympanic membrane repair and functionalised it with antibiotics and steroid drugs to treat CSOM.

3, Grant name: 2022 Telethon 7 Research Grant (\$143k)

Project Title: Establishing a platform for personalised drug treatment for children with Usher Syndrome

Investigator: Associate Professor Elaine Won

LHF Contribution to Research: \$13.2k

This research program developed a disease modelling platform for translational research into new therapies for children with Usher Syndrome. This pre-clinical model is now being used to identify potential drug candidates for clinical progression.

Financial Year 2025 Budgeted Activity:

1. Support the salary and research costs of International Early Career Fellow

Total LHF contribution: \$61.5K

Dr Christine Bacal is a chemistry researcher who joined Ear Science in 2023 with 8 years' experience working across a wide range of areas including materials engineering, surface science, biochemistry and molecular biology.

Dr Bacal is working on a development project to deliver antibiotics and other drugs via silk films for the treatment of chronic middle ear infection. A tuneable film will be designed to enable precise binding of these drugs with silk.

2.Grant Name: WA FHRI a Scheme Equipment project (\$1m)

Project Title: Australasian Hearing Registry and Biobank

LHF Contribution: \$31.6k

Other contributors: WA State Government: \$500k, Ian Potter Foundation: \$150k

This infrastructure project aims to establish a dedicated facility for genetic screening and biobanking of tissue related to genetic-associated hearing loss. Greater access to genetic samples is needed for scientists to gain better understanding of the genetic cause of hearing loss and develop treatments. Our program will build critical capacity, attracting exceptional researchers to WA to uncover genetic causes and treatments for ear and hearing disorders.








planted and the mural, all finished just as the rain came down.
